

| Narrator: | Part 1A |
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| | David is at home. Someone calls his family and David takes messages for them. |
| (1 st Call) | You now have 10 seconds to study the information for the first conversation. (10-second music) Now, listen to the conversations. The conversations will be played <u>two</u> <u>times</u> . Do as much as you can the first time and complete all the answers the second time. The first conversation will begin now. [(Telephone ringing) |
| David: | Hello. David here. |
| Auntie Lily: | Oh hello, David. It's Auntie Lily. How are you? |
| David: | I'm alright, thank you. How are you? |
| Auntie Lily: | I'm okay. Is your dad there? |
| David: | No, he is out. Can I take a message? |

- Amy: [Hello, I'm Amy. I'm very busy on weekdays and spend hours reading books and doing homework. At weekends, I like to learn something interesting. This year, I will do climbing and windsurfing. Mum said climbing is dangerous, but I told her I would be careful. She agreed to let me go, and I'm going to attend my first lesson this Saturday. I'm also going to take a windsurfing course in a water sports centre later.]

I enjoy cleaning their homes and I never feel tired even after three hours of work. I spend both Saturday and Sunday doing important voluntary work and I never feel bored.]

| Narrator: | Question 7. How many stalls will they have? (beep)(8-second pause) |
| Mary: | Miss Lee, could we have an English singing competition at school? |
| Miss Lee: | Yes. We can ask two music teachers to be the judges. They will decide who the best singer is in the competition. |
| Narrator: | Question 8. In the competition, the two music teachers will (beep)(8-second pause) |
| Mary: | I think we should do something about reading. |
| David: | Perhaps we can invite authors to the English Week, and we can ask questions about their work. |
| Miss Lee: | How about William Lee, a famous local writer? His book 'Stars in the Sky' is very popular. People lined up outside the bookstores when his book first went on sale. He has many teenage readers, too. |
| Mary: | I'm also one of his fans. |
| Miss Lee: | Okay. We've got many good ideas. Well done. Let's put 'English Week' in our diary.] |
