A lot of tiger attacks have happened in India. The human population is moving in on the habitat where the tigers live. Humans and tigers just do not mix!

Meet the seal. The seal has waterproof fur. It also has a layer of fat known as blubber which helps to keep it warm. Seals can hold their breath underwater for two hours and they even sleep in the water!

Seals do not have many predators, but two animals that attack and eat seals for their fat and meat are the great white shark and killer whales. Both the whales and sharks like to play with their prey before they attack and kill it.

It's not a nice thing to see, but it's hard to believe that such big animals can be so quiet before an attack. The poor seals do not notice anything until it's too late to escape!]
